

Scudders Celebrate Revolutionary Legacy

The autumn weather was perfect, the fall foliage spectacular, and the tours fascinating at the Scudder Association Foundation's annual meeting and reunion in the Trenton, NJ, area October 18-20.

Thirty Scudders attended, coming from such distant points as Massachusetts and Hawaii and such inbetween spots as Arizona, Chicago, and Washington, D.C. They enjoyed great food and drink, wonderful conversations with Scudder cousins, visits to historic sites with Scudder connections, and great insights on our family's important role in the Revolutionary War.

The tour started at Washington Crossing Historical Park in Pennsylvania where General George Washington, his 2,400 troops, artillery, and horses crossed the ice-choked Delaware River enroute to his success at the first battle of Trenton, a turning point in the War for Independence.

President Sue Swanson told the group that Scudders played a significant role in the patriots' success on





Christmas night and the following morning in 1776.

The boats which carried the men, cannon and horses were gathered and hidden by our Scudder relatives. The soldiers, many barefoot and freezing in summer clothes, were sheltered in Scudder farms in New Jersey, and Scudders were among the guides that led the American troops along back trails to surprise and defeat the Hessian troops in Trenton.

After crossing the Scudder Falls Bridge to New Jersey, the group visited the Old Barracks in Trenton, the scene of Washington's successful attack on 1,500 Hessian mercenaries, and got a vivid demonstration of "war 1776-style" from battle re-enactors in the courtyard.

Saturday evening brought the annual meeting over excellent dinner choices at the elegant River House at Odette's in New Hope, PA. The weekend ended with a well-attended informal breakfast at our headquarters hotel on Sunday morning.

All in all, it was very much a weekend to remember.

Brrr. It's Cold Up Here... And Down There

here does a shivering Connecticut resident go for a good winter vacation?

South, of course. That's what SAF secretary and board member Clive Conner did last January.

Way, way south. To Antarctica, to be exact.

Having previously visited the bone-chilling climes of the Arctic and Greenland, Antarctica was next on her bucket list. Said Clive, "I'd



been to the top of the world; now I wanted to see the bottom."

The 4,000-mile trip covered three weeks.

Among the things she saw was the largest iceberg in the world. It's the size of Rhode Island. She also saw large (whales and others) and small wildlife numbering in the millions, including over half a million penguins on the shores of one bay.

It was an exciting trip for Clive. But she came back with a warning. Clive wrote that





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this fantastic wildlife is threatened by global warming and a decline in the krill population. Due to global warming, sea ice is melting quickly and young krill, small crustaceans like shrimp, rely on clinging to sea ice for food (algae) and protection from predators during the winter. Also, krill are being illegally overfished to be used in such products as animal feed, cosmetics, fish paste, and fish oil. Clive says we need to reduce our use of all of these products to reduce the decimation of the krill population.

Since virtually every sea creature, large and small, is dependent on a diet of krill, the problem is a serious one. And, with vast ocean expanses to cover, enforcement is sorely lacking.

Clive's next big trip: Southeast India in January to visit the Scudder missions. She'll find it a lot warmer.

A Woman Twice Connected

ne of the highlights of the Washington Crossing
Historical Park tour was seeing the Durham boats,
the type of vessels used in Washington army's crossing of
the Delaware. The boats were 40 to 60 feet long, eight feet
wide, and could handle a large load of horses and artillery.

For SAF Secretary Clive Connor, the exhibition had double meaning. Her ancestors on the Coryell side owned many of the boats and hid them from the British until the moment Washington was ready to launch his attack.

It is said that the Battle of Trenton was planned at John Coryell's tavern in what is now New Hope, PA.

Both the Coryells and the Scudders played key roles in the game-changing victory at Trenton.

News Flashes from India

Big things are happening at the institutions and projects that we help support in India. Here's the latest.

Scudder Memorial Hospital

Construction is moving along rapidly on the new staff quarters complex that will house 16 doctors and nurses and their families. Formal opening is planned for late January.

Walter Scudder School

The Scudder Association Foundation is helping finance construction of the Gordon Sherman Boys' Hostel which will house 90 boys from distant villages, who live too far from Tindivanam to commute to school. No completion date has yet been announced.

CMC Vellore

Named one of the world's leading hospitals in 2024 and ranked number three in India, CMC honored Dr. Soumya Swaminathan, MD, a pediatrician and global expert in tuberculosis and HIV research, with the Dr. Ida S. Scudder Humanitarian Oragion on December 6th.

Arni Secondary School

The school's water system has been upgraded for safety and has been connected to the municipal system. Enrollment has increased from 140 to 265. The beach volleyball team won the district championship and will now compete in the state competition.

Jawadhi Hills

The clinic building was dedicated in early December, one more step toward a planned 24-hour hospital. A matching fundraising effort by Jack Gillmar and Dr. Jim Taylor raised over \$100,000 for this project. Meanwhile, a small CMC-funded day clinic in Veerapanoor Village serves 60 outpatients a day in an area with high disease rates and widespread poverty which has been likened to Appalachia in the U.S.

Our India Missions

The Scudder Association gives financial support to two hospitals and two schools founded by our Scudder missionary ancestors in southeast India. Following is a brief description of each.

Christian Medical Center and College in Vellore. Founded by Dr. Ida Scudder in 1902. One of India's largest and most respected hospitals. Named one of the world's leading hospitals in 2024 and ranked number three in India.

Scudder Memorial Hospital in Ranipet. Founded in 1866 by Dr. Silas Scudder, Sue Swanson's great-grandfather and Jim Taylor's great-great-grandfather. Serves 500 patients a day in an area of Appalachian level poverty of 100 communities and 2.5 million people, many treated at

low cost or free.

Arni School in Arni. A coed institution founded around 1860 by Ezekiel Scudder, SAF Board member Jack Gillmar's great-grandfather. Its students attend free of charge. The Scudder Foundation funds teachers for the 11th and 12th grades.

Walter Scudder School in Tindivanam. Founded by missionary Walter Scudder in 1925. He was Cynthia Sherman's grandfather and Claudia Orchanian's greatgrandfather. Walter was Aunt Ida's brother-in-law since he married her college roommate Ellen (Nelle) Barthomew. It serves over 900 boys and girls in grades six to twelve, many of whom go on to college and successful careers.

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
